

God Made Me Bloom

In My Mother's Womb

Sooner or later you'll hear people ask questions like these: When does a baby become a real person? Is it during the first month inside its mother? How about after the sixth month? Or maybe only after it's born?

Questions like these are silly to God, because he feels the same way about you as he did about Jeremiah. God knew all about you and loved you even before he made you *bloom* in your mother's womb. And he will remain your best friend throughout your entire life. After that, he wants to spend all of eternity with you. Always remember that God knows and loves everything about you, from womb to tomb, and beyond.

Key Verse

*I knew you before I formed you in your mother's **womb**. Before you were born I set you apart and appointed you as my prophet to the nations.*

Jeremiah 1:5

Click

Your child will be able to state the meaning of this Bible verse in their own words.

Stick

The life application meaning of this verse is tied to the image of a rose **bloom**.

Click-er: Bloom

Whenever you see, smell, or think about a *rose bloom*, let the fragrance of this HoneyWord fill your heart as it clicks and sticks.



Read Jeremiah 1:5

Make-it-Stick

The next time you're in a grocery store, or a florist's shop, pick up a rose and carefully examine the strong stem, the beautiful color, and the soft petals. Remember that God enjoys admiring you even more than you enjoy admiring that rose. As you put the rose back, thank God for making you special, and say this HoneyWord Lesson.

Everyone Take Turns Explaining the Meaning of this Lesson in Your Own Words

Ask, "What does this lesson mean?" If the answer is in the ballpark of the correct meaning, praise that person out loud. Then ask another to explain it. Do this 2 or 3 times in a row.

Hold Up the Click-er

Hold up the Click-er (rose bloom) and say this HoneyWord Lesson out loud:

"God made me *bloom* in my mother's womb."

Then repeat it out loud together one more time.

Pair Up in Small Groups of Two

If you're with more than one child, have your children pair up and ask each other to say the lesson out loud to each other.

Re-Group and Recite Again

Ask one child to say the lesson one more time, and then explain what it means.
