When Anyone Messes With Me



Jesus knows that some adults and older kids look down on younger kids and try to take advantage of them. It sort of makes sense if you think about it.

When we're younger, we're shorter, smaller, weaker, and pretty much know less about everything ... except how to please God by trusting him. And that trust—that faith—is what God loves seeing most in children.

Key Verse

Click

Your child will now be able to say the meaning of this Bible verse in their own words.

Stick

The life application meaning of this verse is tied to the image of an **angel**.

Clicker: Angel

Whenever you see, wonder, read, or think about *angels*, let this HoneyWord stand by your heart as it clicks and sticks.



Read Matthew 18:10

Make-it-Stick

Draw a picture of what you think a guardian angel looks like. Now think of a time when someone looked down on you or was unkind. What do you think that guardian angel whispered to God then? If you want to, ask God to forgive and help that person. Someone you feel comfortable with—your dad or mom, a teacher, a pastor, or another adult friend can help you know what to pray.

Everyone Take Turns Explaining the Meaning of this Lesson in Your Own Words

Ask, "What does this lesson mean?" If the answer is in the ballpark of the correct meaning, praise that person out loud. Then ask another child to explain it. Do this 2 or 3 times in a row.

Hold Up the Clicker

Hold up the Click-er (angel) and say this HoneyWord Lesson out loud:

"Guardian *angels* see when anyone messes with me."

Then repeat it out loud together one more time.

Pair Up in Small Groups of Two

If you're with more than one child, have your children pair up and ask each other to say the lesson out loud to each other.

Re-Group and Recite Again

Ask one child to say the lesson one more time, and then explain what it means.
